
The Human Condition

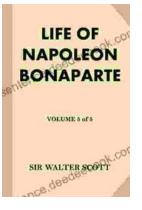

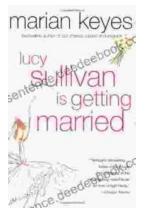
