
Citizen Genêt: French Revolutionary Utopian Leader and Texas Frontier Photographer

Early Life and Career

Edmond-Charles Genêt was born in Versailles, France, in 1763. His father was a diplomat and his mother was a writer. Genêt received a privileged education and studied law at the University of Paris. After graduating, he entered the French diplomatic service.

Diplomatic Clash

Genêt's diplomatic mission quickly turned sour. He openly criticized President George Washington and Secretary of State Thomas Jefferson, and he even threatened to appeal to the American people over the heads of the government. In response, Washington demanded Genêt's recall, and the French government eventually complied.

Utopian Schemes


Legacy




