

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Habitat

Enclosure Size and Setup

Red Eye Crocodile Skinks require a spacious enclosure that mimics their natural habitat. 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
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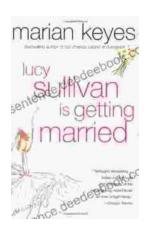
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
