

Understanding Music Notation



Clef

The first step in reading bass guitar music is to familiarize yourself with the clef. The bass clef, also known as the F clef, is a symbol that indicates the range of pitches on the musical staff. The bass clef is positioned on the fourth line of the staff, where the two dots surround the line.

Notes



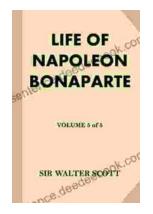

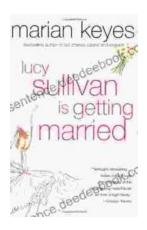
