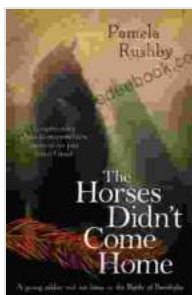


The Horses Didn't Come Home

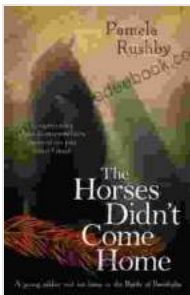
